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Growing in transparency,

After my first few months in the role of International Director, I believe more than ever that we must work together for the good of SIM and the good of the gospel.

In last year's Prayer Guide, I quoted 1 Corinthians 12, when Paul tells the church, "Just as a body, though one, has many parts but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ."

The more I see SIM at work, the more convinced I am that Paul's teaching applies to our entities, just as much as it does to our individual people. The way we help people transition from, say, North East India to Ghana, or Korea to Malawi, or Ecuador to Pakistan, is through our entities working together; the way we move money around the world is through our entities working together; and the way we care for people living far from their passport country is through our entities working together.

For entities to work well together, there must be a culture of transparency, trust and belonging in SIM. That is something we are still working on. Indeed, it may be something that we will always be working on but those values are vital for our organisation to work effectively.

Why transparency? Each and every entity needs to be open about what its teams are doing, about how they are doing it and about the challenges they face. To achieve that level of transparency relies on good governance, so it is vital that our boards are functioning well and fully aware of the responsibilities they have.

Jesus displayed astonishing transparency in the garden of Gethsemane when he spoke to Peter and 'the two sons of Zebedee': "Then he said to them, 'My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me."

Even though Jesus knew his mission on earth was to die on the cross, he showed his true feelings to his disciples. He was utterly transparent and wanted them to stay near him as his hour of death approached.

Why trust? Only entities which trust each other will be able to work well together. If there is distrust on either side, the relationship will be undermined and will not develop as it should. That level of trust relies on us all sharing information appropriately and using the systems we have in place for that – it requires trusting transparency!

Jesus displays huge trust in his disciples when he instructs them in the words of the Great Commission in Matthew 28: "Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy

Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

He trusts them and he promises to be with them, giving them all the encouragement and support they need to accomplish his mission. As our entities trust each other, so they offer encouragement and support to each other as they play their part in God's mission.

Why belonging? We have talked for many years about how diverse we are as an organisation and we have certainly become a lot more diverse during my time in SIM. But I'm not sure that we yet have a culture where all our diverse people, from whichever context they come from and in whichever context they are ministering, feel they truly belong to our organisation. We must continue to work hard on creating a culture and environment where all can say they belong.

Paul's letters often address this whole issue of belonging, as he seeks to build unity in the early church. As he writes in Ephesians 3: "This mystery is that through the gospel the Gentiles are heirs together with Israel, members together of one body, and sharers together in the promise in Christ Jesus." Just as it was vital that the Gentiles felt they truly belonged to the church, so it is vital that all our people feel they truly belong to SIM. That is a powerful witness to the gospel in the communities we serve.

One of our core values says that we are strengthened by diversity: We are intentionally interdenominational, international and multi-ethnic. We believe we will become more effective in ministry as we incorporate the richness of cultural diversity in SIM and celebrate our oneness in Christ.

As you pray through the entries in this Prayer Guide, I hope that you get a sense of our great diversity, but also of our oneness in Christ. Individually, we are bound together by our desire to see disciples of the Lord Jesus in communities where he is least known; our entities are bound together by their signing of the Mission Agreement.

My prayer is that we will see an SIM in which all our constituent parts, both individual and entity, are flourishing in a culture of

transparency, trust and belonging. That will be a culture in which God's wisdom can show through us and enable us to have an even greater gospel impact than we do now.



Ministry

- Outreach disciple-making and church planting in marginalised communities among the Nyaneka, and in the Cavango and Lubango areas, with a priority on youth because 56 per cent of Angola's population is aged 18 or under. This includes health, agriculture, education and vocational training.
- Serving and equipping churches for mission by equipping missional Angolan church leaders and workers in theological education and discipleship; compassionate ministries in communities through animal husbandry, business as mission, food and water security, community health evangelism and skill-training programmes.
- Leadership and services, caring for and equipping the SIM team and partners in leadership development, information technology, business planning and implementation, and technical support.

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Communities where Christ is least known

Marginalised communities

The Nyaneka live in poverty, are subject to droughts, poor food and water security and are frequently ill with malaria, diarrhoeal illnesses and tuberculosis. They are marginalised because their witchcraft is feared.

However, Nyaneka believers are evangelising and planting churches. Praise God for the New Testament, the Jesus Film and a few Theological Education by Extension books in Nyaneka. The Old Testament translation is in progress. Some believers have embraced Farming God's Way with good results.

Other marginalised people are women with urinary incontinence from fistulas after prolonged labour in childbirth. Many suffer disdain, rejection and abuse, and desperately

need physical and emotional healing. They need Jesus.

- marginalised people: women with obstetric fistulas, and people with tuberculosis,
 AIDS and epilepsy, who are thought to be cursed
- the publication of all 25 Theological Education by Extension books in Nyaneka-Mwila and the completion of the Old Testament translation. Pray for trained church and literacy workers
- Angolan church leaders to be missional, strong in discipleship and in youth ministry
- ISTEL Seminary activities for mobilising missions. The September 2025 conference will be focused on the Muslim community
- the young trainee surgeons at CEML Hospital to grow spiritually and learn well.
 Pray for faculty trainers for this next generation of Angolan surgeons and the associated physical expansion and personnel development of CEML Hospital
- workers gifted in IT, administration, business planning, supervision and technical matters for hospitals and other partner health evangelism ministries
- additional SIM personnel for youth, health, home-schooling, theological education, agriculture, literacy and translation ministries
- the 100,000 deaf people who have asked for an Angolan sign language Bible

Australia



Vision

Convinced that everyone needs to hear the gospel, our heart is to make disciples of Jesus in communities where he is least known. We partner with local Australian churches in equipping and sending out cross-cultural gospel workers, with a variety of skills and talents, to serve in a diverse range of ministries.

Ministry

- To inspire and partner with churches to fulfil God's local, cross-cultural and global mission.
- To mobilise and equip mission workers to reach the least-reached with the gospel, both globally and locally, through the Across ministry.

- To promote ways for people to play their part in God's global mission, whether that be through ministry opportunities, prayerful support or financial partnership.

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Communities where Christ is least known

Increasingly secular people

Traditionally a Christian nation with freedom of religion, Australia is becoming increasingly secular. The dominant ideology has become an individualistic, New Age spirituality with no accountability. While 52.1 per cent of Australians identify as Christian, only eight per cent attend church regularly.

Antagonism towards the church and its perceived intolerance and authoritarianism is increasing, especially in the media.




Immigrants, refugees and overseas students

Australia is one of the most culturally diverse

nations in the world, with 30 per cent of the population born overseas and up to 550,000 international students arriving each year. These immigrants and students bring a variety of religions with them. To faithfully reach these people groups in our own backyard, SIM Australia has developed Across, a local ministry which helps SIM workers within Australia reach communities which have yet to hear the gospel, including immigrants, refugees and university students.

- SIM Australia's mission workers to follow Jesus closely and know his empowering to be effective and fruitful in their ministry
- challenging Australian believers to discover the part they can play in God's mission
- partnering and equipping churches to minister to cross-cultural communities around them and to see mission as central to church ministry
- the Lord of the harvest to raise up more churches and workers in communities where Christ is least known, both overseas and locally through Across
- our Home Ministry Team as we connect with those who go, and provide services and resources to prepare and send them well

Bangladesh



That Bangladeshi people will know God's love and share his love with their neighbours; that Bangladeshi communities will be transformed by this great love.

Ministry

- Children's Uplift Programme: serving women and their children who are vulnerable to, or survivors of, human trafficking.
- Arsenic Poisoning Prevention Programme: providing education, filters and treatment for arsenic poisoning, a common ailment in Bangladesh.
- Transformation centres: providing education opportunities, such as English language classes and primary classes for children in the slums to promote new development in impoverished communities.
- Salam Training Centre: a vocational school providing trade training for young people to develop life skills.
- Theological Training Programme: a distance learning school to disciple Christians throughout the country.

Bengalis


Bengalis are by far the largest ethnic community in Bangladesh, which is a densely populated country of about 175 million people. Bengalis are very conversational, hospitable and community-minded people. Many revere God and desire to please him but don't know the good news as presented in the Bible. Most Bengali people live in rural villages. Floods and cyclones often bring devastation to these communities. The capital of Bangladesh, Dhaka, is a bustling mega-city which is home to more than 22 million people.

- growth in the number of healthy churches around the country
- training and development of church pastors
- growth in our team so we can plant new rural teams

Next Gen

Street kids, children impacted by HIV and AIDS, girls living in rural villages and university students are some of the next generation of adults and leaders in Benin and Togo who have yet to hear about Jesus or experience his saving grace.



SIM Benin Togo workers and church partners are reaching out to many of them


through practical acts of love, holiday Bible school programmes, kids' clubs, Bible studies in local languages and student groups.

Children sitting in Benin and Togo's classrooms need to meet Jesus too. Many see him embodied in their Christian teachers, who see themselves as ambassadors of the King. Church-founded schools, attended by many children from Muslim homes, can enrol their leaders on the Program of School Improvement, which is run by the Association of Christian Schools International. Our church partners walk with school leaders through a two-year structured programme to help ensure the next generation has an encounter with Jesus at school.

In community, school leaders are developing a biblical worldview and evaluating the structures and practices of their establishments so that they are truly God-honouring. As teachers learn that God reveals himself through the subjects they teach, a shaft of gospel light shines into classrooms and from the classrooms into homes and communities where hitherto Christ has been least known.

- Sports Friends in growing neighbourhoods of Sucre.

Families with special needs kids

Many Bolivian families face the challenge of raising special needs children with few outside resources. They are often marginalised and alone. We are reaching out to them with the love of Jesus, showing them how special they are in his eyes and helping these children and their families thrive.




City and rural dwellers

We envision a coalition of Bolivian churches committed to knowing Christ and making him known in Bolivian cities, unreached rural areas and around the world. To this end, the La Paz team trains Bolivian Christians to plant disciple-making, missional churches in the city of La Paz, unreached jungles, rural communities of Bolivia and around the world.

Pray for

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- God to guide the La Paz team as they train and mentor church planters
- parents of disabled children to feel Christ's love through the skills taught and the care provided in support groups
- educators to employ new skills as they teach children with various disabilities
- trusting relationships with mining families to allow spiritual conversations
- incarnational ministry to shoe-shiners that will transform them into disciples of Christ and break the cycle of poverty
- Quechua believers to truly understand the gospel of grace and God's protection from false teaching
- churches to embrace sports ministry to reach children in their communities
- unity on our multi-ethnic and multi-generational SIM team
- new workers to join these opportunities

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Communities where Christ is least known

Remote dwellers of the Kalahari Desert

The San are considered to have the oldest culture in the world. Beautiful San rock art can be seen throughout southern Africa, where the San lived as hunter-gatherers. They are expert hunters, using bows and poison-tipped arrows. Hunting is a collaborative exercisend the meat is always shared among the group.



Over the past 2,000 years, the San have slowly been pushed to live in the arid sands of the Kalahari Desert. Today, the San find it very difficult to maintain their traditional culture and lifestyle. The land they used to hunt on is increasingly being used for grazing cattle.

In partnership with the Africa Evangelical Church, SIM has engaged with the !Xoon San of the Kalahari for more than 30 years. For 16 years, the ministry was carried out by full-time mission workers living in the desert. These mission workers retired in 2018, leaving a translation of Luke's gospel, around 90 recorded Bible stories, Sunday school material and a worship CD as their legacy.

Pray for

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- Botswana SIM appointees who are developing prayer partners and raising support, that the Lord would lead them to the place he has prepared for them
- more believers to hear the Lord's calling into ministry of mission
- local translators among the remote desert dwellers of the Kalahari, that they would persevere in their ministry without the support of expatriate mission workers
- the work of examining shame/honour perspectives of biblical theology and applying them to strengthen a good understanding of God's instructions
- children and young people to grow in their faith and apply biblical truths in their daily lives
- people bound by animistic traditions to be set free
- theological training for many untrained pastors in various churches

Brazil



Vision

Christ's church was called to serve, to be salt and light of the world, and to reach the lost with God's love - those who are close and those who are far. We have received the privilege and priority in the evangelisation of people where Christ has not yet been proclaimed.

Ministry

- Missionary mobilisation.
- · Combating human trafficking.
- Mission worker awakening.

Communities where Christ is least known

Indigenous peoples

In Brazil, there are 344 ethnic groups speaking 181 languages. Of these, 164 ethnicities are considered unreached and 99 continue without any church engagement. There are dozens of people groups without a mission worker presence and with no knowledge of the gospel.



Ribeirinhos and others

Living alongside the hundreds of rivers and streams in the Amazon basin, there are about 37.000 separate Ribeirinhos communities. Most, but not all, within a 100-kilometre radius of a major city have been reached.

There are about one million people known as 'gypsies' in Brazil, from three predominant groups: the Calon, the Rom and the Sinti. Each has a distinct language, culture and customs.



Among the Sertanejos, the evangelical


presence has grown in recent years, but thousands of sites and towns are not yet reached. There are still more than 6,000 groups with no gospel knowledge.

The Quilombolas are formed by communities of African descendants who have settled in remote areas in the last 200 years. They are across Brazil, but with a greater presence in the north east. An estimated 2,000 communities remain without a church.

. Pray for

- effective direction and involvement of the Brazilian church in mission mobilisation
- financial resources so that mission work may be carried out, both on Brazilian soil and at the ends of the earth
- the church to get involved in sending new workers to plant new churches
- workers who are preparing to go out into cross-cultural mission
- new workers and those already serving to have their financial needs secured
- new partnerships to emerge to reach the less reached
- new Christians to join a worshipping community
- cooperation with anything that will reach and strengthen the unity of the body of Christ

Burkina Faso Day



Vision

We glorify God by making disciples of the people in Burkina Faso as we proclaim Jesus Christ and minister to human needs, to equip the church for her growth and partner with her as she ministers to people less-reached by the good news.

- Aid distribution to internally displaced and suffering people.
- Scripture translation and audio production.
- Evangelism and discipleship.
- Medical centres.
- Theological education.
- Ministry to at-risk young women.
- Ministry among street boys.
- Community development and well-drilling.
- Ministries to people with disabilities.
- English classes as a base for evangelism.

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Communities where Christ is least known

Internally displaced people

Burkina Faso is among the 10 poorest countries in the world. Historically known for its stability, terrorist activity has led to an increase in violence and insecurity resulting in nearly two million internally displaced people as of February, 2023.

Many of these people live in makeshift refugee camps, where water and food are scarce. Other displaced people are seeking shelter with extended family, which can put already fragile financial situations under extreme stress.

Most people in Burkina Faso depend on their farms for their food and their livelihood. But with the increase in violence, access to fields and markets can be challenging and often dangerous.

Burkina Faso faces wide fluctuations in weather that impact crop growth. This can be catastrophic to an economy that is heavily reliant on subsistence farming. Famine is a major and growing problem.

- Networking, coaching and mobilisation of local churches to reach their communities more effectively.



We celebrate the wisdom of God who has brought SIM workers from a variety of countries and backgrounds here. Their specialised cultural experiences and insights are helping the Canadian church reach their new neighbours more effectively.

SIM has 57 workers serving from coast to coast, building inroads for the gospel among marginalised and immigrant communities.



Pray for

• a Holy Spirit-inspired strategic vision for SIM Canada in Quebec and new workers to join that vision. With less than one per cent evangelical, Quebec is the least-reached province in Canada and has been very resistant to the gospel

- more than 100,000 temporary foreign workers come to Canada to work on farms and in agriculture-related jobs every year. Pray for new SIM workers and for open doors with farm owners to allow us to reach these workers
- the cost of living has sky-rocketed, especially within the urban communities in which most SIM workers are serving across Canada. Pray for God's provision for SIM workers as they trust the Lord for the increased financial support they need
- many SIM workers use ESL (English as a Second Language) teaching as an effective approach to reach the lost. Pray the seed of the gospel will find good ground in many hearts throughout these ministries
- SIM workers serving First Nations communities across Canada; for grace and wisdom as they minister to many who are in difficult situations and build bridges of reconciliation
- the vital role of administration as ministry. Administration is often the least supported, prayed for (or attractive) ministry but it is crucially important to sustain our initiatives and make them effective
- Canada as a sending country, that Canadians will be prompted to mobilise and respond to the global needs presented to them

Children and youth

Good schools are important to families. In one region, two pre-schools are reaching out to families by giving children a firm foundation. Although these schools don't teach the Bible, they do use Biblical principles as a basis for all teaching. These schools are impacting the lives of families and staff.

Sport is a great way to reach youth. Floorball is a popular sport in Central Asia. The Floorball Movement desires to see the multiplication of Jesus disciples through floorball youth camps and tournaments throughout Central Asia.



Uzbekistan is the most populous country in Central Asia, but only 0.02 per cent of the people are Christians. In rural areas, new believers are often persecuted by their friends

and neighbours, yet stand firm in their new faith. There is often no fellowship or preacher to help them grow in their relationship with Jesus. A worker in one rural village is leading a small group of believers in Bible study and worship. Sometimes the teaching is done in the dark for security. Believers within the group are being equipped to lead worship and Bible studies. The children are also learning Bible stories and memorising entire chapters of the Bible. People in rural areas are eager to learn, but applying biblical principles to daily life is often hard. Workers are needed to disciple them.






We work to help the Chilean church grow in its capacity and commitment to send workers to serve where Christ is

Fulani Christian leaders in Burkina are standing strong and seeing previously Islamic Fulani come to faith. Praise God for the collaboration between these Burkina leaders and workers in northern Côte d'Ivoire, among the significant Fulani population.



Those marginalised through trauma

In Abidjan, many children have suffered trauma and neglect and are living on the streets. Many women have been sexually exploited and are trapped in human trafficking. Others suffer the effects of trauma from the 2002-2011 civil war.


Spiritual and emotional healing is needed for these precious people to experience freedom and restoration.

Those at risk from human trafficking

There was a sharp increase in prostitution in Czechia after the Velvet Revolution in 1989. Numerous prostitution hotspots emerged, particularly in northern and western Bohemia, especially near major highways leading to Austria and Germany, and in the capital city, Prague.

Czechia is a source of, and a transit and destination country for, trafficked women and children, currently with a significant increase in Ukrainian women. The 21st century has been characterised by the shift of sexual services to the online environment but, at the same time, some women choose this as their job despite it being illegal in Czechia. This makes it more challenging to reach and serve women and children. There are only a handful of Christians, churches and local organisations focusing on this issue. We strive to network and connect everyone who wants to serve in this area with a vision to reach out with love, service and the gospel.

Ukraine

We are very touched by the ongoing war in Ukraine. Although there are many active churches and mission organisations in Ukraine, everyone is facing new challenges. This year, we are trying to map the current greatest needs and all potential partners so we can find where we can get involved, both in Ukraine and among refugees in Central and Eastern Europe.

We are grateful for the numerous partners already operating in Ukraine and the many Ukrainian churches across Europe, which have decided to do their best and serve where they are, even if they have not chosen to be there.

We are convinced we should also offer our expertise in sending and receiving workers, networking, supporting churches, and trauma healing ministry.

Desert tribes of north Africa and the Middle East

Desert tribes live in the Sahara Desert in North Africa, the Negev, and the Arabian Peninsula in the Middle East. These tribes are predominantly nomadic, with a rich cultural context that can be challenging to penetrate. Christ is least known in these communities and there is limited access to the gospel. The EASO strives to reach some



of these communities, such as the Fulani. To share the good news, we need dedicated workers and teams who are willing to share their lives and ensure the good news is shared in all communities.

- an upcoming conference in Addis Ababa focusing on how to share the good news among the desert tribes in Africa and the Middle East
- consistent financial support for our workers
- safety for our new workers who are facing difficult circumstances engaging in new ministry among the desert tribes
- physical healing for our workers who are suffering from health issues
- visible fruit in their ministry efforts, with lives transformed by the power of the gospel
- quick acquisition of language skills so our workers can communicate the gospel effectively

East Asia Day



Vision

We envision churches in East Asia being discipled, equipped, motivated and mobilised to send workers to reach those who are living and dying without hearing God's good news. We want to see our members raising disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ in communities where he is least known. Together with churches, we commit ourselves to the cause of the Great Commission, through praying, giving, mobilising, sending and receiving workers.

BHT

BHT is located on the southern slopes of the eastern Himalayas in south Asia and has three major ethnic unreached people groups. Buddhism is the main religion and other religions, including Christianity, are practised by just one per cent of the population. It is not easy to get a visa or permit to work here. Unlike Buddhism and Hinduism, Christianity is not a registered religion but fellowships and practices are happening, protected by fundamental constitutional rights. Construction of church buildings is not allowed but believers are using their homes for fellowship






gatherings. Public preaching of the gospel is illegal and conversion is against the law. Those who turn to Christianity face strong opposition from society and families. Since expatriate members cannot be sent to work in BHT, efforts are being made to raise local leaders to reach the unreached.

Diaspora

Diaspora ministries are gaining significance as more and more Asian (Indonesian, Chinese, Indian) diaspora communities and international students are moving in huge numbers to East Asia and other parts of the world. They are a rich harvest field on the doorstep, and we have a great opportunity to share the love of Christ with them. SIM East Asia is strategising to reach out to these communities with the gospel of Christ, along with partnering churches and like-minded organisations.

- SIM East Asia's strategies to equip and send members to focus on frontline evangelism and discipleship, so producing missional churches and turning mission fields into mission forces
- intentional and strategic efforts to draw young people to serve in mission
- clarity for diaspora and international student ministry leaders to focus and strategise their ministries
- God to supply the funds for SIM East Asia's projected growth, operation, ministries and projects
- wisdom and resources in developing the capacity of the region to receive workers
- cross-departmental efforts focusing on succession plans for SIM East Asia staff, leaders, members of key committees and field members

Our workers serve among a variety of belief systems including staunch folk Catholicism, Incan animism, and New Age practices.


We strive to build unity among the churches and help these believers develop a vision for how God can use them to reach their community, despite rejection and opposition.

- Coming alongside new churches planted in vulnerable neighbourhoods in Addis Ababa.

- Striving for all ministries to work through or toward the local church. We follow the
 example of Jesus by bringing truth and demonstrating love to the whole person and
 community and we strengthen the capacity of congregations and disciples towards
 maturity and inter-dependence.

Children and youth

More than half of all Ethiopians (approximately 117 million people) are under 20. Most of them have limited opportunities to come to know Christ and become his followers.

Vulnerable people

In a primarily rural country, the urban population is now around 20 per cent and growing fast. Poverty and abuse remain major issues, especially among newcomers to urban areas. Girls and homeless street boys are at risk of being trafficked.

Displaced and war-affected peoples

Over the last four years, Ethiopia has been affected by civil war. Many communities, particularly in the north, are still suffering or are

trying to rebuild lives, homes and communities. The food supply is unstable in many areas.



Pray for

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- churches and church members who have received youth, business or contextualisation training from SIM ministries to put the lessons into practice for gospel impact
- mission decisions and wisdom as travel and ministry, especially outside Addis Ababa, are limited because many areas of the country are unsafe
- recruitment of excellent teachers with a passion for making disciples among students and advancing mission outreach at Bingham Academy
- a healthy and prayer-led environment in our SIM administrative offices

The Faithful Witness initiative exists to launch multi-skilled, multi-ethnic teams in communities around the world which have limited or no access to the gospel. Vision

Our vision is to bring an end to human trafficking and exploitation in the communities where SIM serves and see lives transformed as those communities come to know Christ. We focus on preventing human trafficking by working with SIM teams, partner ministries and local churches to protect those who are most vulnerable and at risk. We are guided by our strategic framework which comprises six ministry building blocks that prevent human trafficking, protect the vulnerable and bring Jesus to those in need: awareness, relationships, protection, resilience, integrity and transformation.

Ministry

- Strategic guidance, resources and training to SIM teams, workers and local churches seeking to protect those at risk.
- Support, training and encouragement for those working with vulnerable communities.

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Communities where Christ is least known

Girls

Girls are particularly vulnerable to becoming victims of human trafficking and exploitation, often due to lack of access to education or cultural gender expectations. They are commonly trafficked into situations of domestic servitude, sexual exploitation and forced marriage. Around 18 per cent of all trafficking victims are girls aged under 18.

The For Freedom Network supports several ministries working to prevent the trafficking of vulnerable girls. In West and southern Africa, network members teach the Dignity




Campaign, promoting self-esteem and Christian identity among young women and girls, helping build their resilience so they are less likely to be trafficked.

People who are sexually exploited

Although only 12 per cent of those in slavery are trafficked for the purpose of sexual exploitation, it is perhaps the most traumatic form of human trafficking. It's not only women and girls who are trafficked for this purpose; men, boys and the LGBTQ+ community are also sexually exploited in brothels, homes, hotels and, increasingly, online.

Several countries in the world are realising the danger and damage involved in prostitution and are moving to adopt a model of legislation known as the Equality Model. This legislation targets those who do the buying and selling of sexual services and provides support for those in prostitution to leave. It has been shown to reduce rates of sexual exploitation and trafficking significantly.

International students

There are 400,000 international students in France, of whom almost 100,000 come from Muslim countries.

Our workers collaborate with French evangelical organisations and churches to do outreach and discipleship with those students.

Refugees

In 2022, nearly 131,000 asylum applications were submitted by foreign refugees. The main origin country is Afghanistan, but many others are represented, such as Bangladesh, Turkey, and DR Congo. Our workers collaborate with French evangelical organisations and churches to do outreach through literacy, administrative help and discipleship.





Diaspora outreach

Predominant people groups coming to, or settled in, Germany include Ukrainians, Syrians, Iraqis, Afghanis, Pakistanis, Somalis, Eritreans, Kurds, Turks, English and French-speaking West Africans.



The Ruhr region

The Ruhr, in Northrhine-Westfalia, is the largest metropolitan area in Germany with a population of 5.1 million and annual growth of 43,000 people spread over 53 cities. It has the highest migration density in Germany, from every nation (eg 26 per cent Turkish, 18 per cent Polish). It also has the highest number of students and foreign students in Germany.

International and multi-cultural churches and students


Reaching the multi-cultural communities in cities. There are around 475,000 overseas students studying at German universities. The largest group is from India (42,500) with significant groups from Asia, the Middle East and North Africa.

Secular Germans

Germany is rapidly becoming a secularised community. Regions in eastern and northern Germany have little or no local or personal Christian witness. There are opportunities for workers from all over the world.

Vision

- Equipping the church for training Christians in missional business and work.

Sisaala, Dagomba and Fulbe

For many years, SIM Ghana has worked among the Sisaala and Dagomba people groups. Both identify as Muslim but also hold strongly to their traditional roots. SIM works with local churches to share the good news of God in these communities.



Together, we are intentional in training, developing and strengthening local church

leadership within these communities. There is an emphasis on children and youth through Sports Friends ministries, and, more recently, working with the church in the care of vulnerable women and widows.

In the last six years, SIM Ghana has been serving among the Fulbe (Fulani) people. Team members are continuing to build friendships with the Fulbe through the hard work of learning their language, customs and culture, and through opportunities in health care, discipleship and children's literacy.

People living with, and impacted by, HIV

Globally, 39 million people are living with Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). In 2022, 1.3 million people became infected with HIV (46 per cent of them women and girls), and 630,000 people died of AIDS-related causes.

While decades of global effort have significantly advanced treatment and care, inequalities continue to be a key, concerning driver of HIV. Already vulnerable populations are becoming increasingly affected by heightened risks of poverty, exploitation, homelessness, school dropout, discrimination and loss of opportunities.


In response, Hope for Life is focusing on

holistic and integrated responses to protect the vulnerable in some of society's most marginalised communities and those in which Christ is least known.

India



Vision

SIM operates in two distinct regions of India – North East India, which is east of Bangladesh and comes under SIM East Asia; and the rest of India, which is a separate SIM entity.

In North East India, SIM facilitates and partners with local churches to send mission workers to the 'ends of the earth'. In northern India, SIM seeks to be a witness to Christ, transforming communities where he is least known.

Ministry

- Equip and mobilise churches through seminars on mission, partnership, member care and conflict resolution.
- Mobilise, recruit, assess and orient those called to cross-cultural mission.
- Equip churches and their leadership for local and cross-cultural mission.

Marus

Marus are a traditionally businessoriented people group spread throughout much of northern India, Pakistan and Nepal. They are a tight-knit community of around eight million people, who speak their own language.

Marus are predominantly Hindu but there are large minorities of Jain and Muslim adherents and a small number of Christians. The best way into Maru communities is through relationships cultivated through business.

- more local and international workers being called to go to India's unreached Maru community; transformational businesses to start which will allow workers to build relationships among the Maru
- mobilisation and development of teams working in communities where Christ is not known
- creativity, increased networks and provision for developing transformational businesses
- those involved in education through our two international schools, as well as informal educational settings, to be a positive light to their students
- efforts to equip local believers to be a witness in their workplaces to bear good fruit among the least-reached

Sundanese

The world's largest population of Muslims live in Indonesia and many do not have a gospel witness. Sunda is the largest ethnic group living and dying without Christ. Most of the 38 million Sundanese live in the villages of West Java and are tenant farmers. Small communities are displaced on other islands, some in very squalid conditions such as rubbish dumps. Workers in these communities are providing non-formal schooling to the children.

Sundanese are known for their kindness and believe that having the Sundanese character is the best path of life. Although they look happy on the outside, Sundanese






are dominated by fear and shame. They are attracted to the experience of authentic love, even if that love is from a Christian. Many are open to the gospel, but there is no large movement to Christ.

Discipling Sunda believers is very difficult. New converts face intense pressure to return to their old faith, first from family and then from the wider community.

- people of integrity to help SIM Indonesia be registered as a legal entity and lead SIM Indonesia into the future
- revival in Indonesia's 72,000 churches. Many do not have a vision for mission; some are nominal. Evangelicals are only 3.2 per cent of Indonesia's 280 million people

- Indonesia's 548 people groups that have heard the gospel to grow spiritually as disciples of Jesus
- Indonesian churches to be burdened to share the gospel with the nation's 239 people groups who are living and dying without Christ

- wisdom, joy and perseverance for SIM Indonesia's workers

International Leadership & Services



The vision of SIM is to see a witness to Christ's love where he is least known, disciples of Jesus expressing God's love in their communities and Christ-centred churches among all peoples.

SIM's Purpose Statement is: Convinced that no one should live and die without hearing God's good news, we believe that He has called us to make disciples of Jesus Christ in communities where He is least known.

Ministry

Our ministries help clear barriers for those whom God is calling to serve crossculturally. Our staff serve around the world, including the US, Canada, UK, Kenya, South Africa and New Zealand. We strive to provide:

Equipping our entities for the task

As a global organisation our purpose is clear: to make disciples of the Lord Jesus in communities where he is least known.

That is what our entities are doing on a daily basis and it is the role of International Leadership and Services to help equip them for that task. We do that by providing a range of services, including training, financial infrastructure, communications, personnel and member care, as well as global leadership. We strive constantly to listen to our entities so that we can better understand what they need and how we can provide it.

When our governance structure changed back in 2014, we had just eight signatory entities – that is, entities which had signed the Mission Agreement, committing them to work together for a shared goal, using an agreed set of policies, principles and practices. Since then, the number of signatory entities has grown rapidly and we now have more than 50.

It has been thrilling to see that growth, as more and more entities and their governing boards, with a diverse set of voices, take ownership of our work in their locations. Of course, that has come with many challenges but we are convinced that it is God's will that the diversity of the kingdom of God be reflected in SIM.

SIM has dozens of ministries to least-reached communities, helping people hear and understand the truth of the gospel. We pray that ILS will continue to help them do that.

- greater connection and collaboration between our entities, so they can better share knowledge and resources
- wisdom for the leaders of ILS, as they strive to find cost-effective ways of providing the services a global mission needs
- SIM board members to fully grasp the role they play in leading SIM and holding teams accountable

In Japan, SIM ministers through SIM Japan and a strategic partnership with A3 (formerly Asian Access).

A3 Vision and Mission

Our vision is to see a vibrant community of servant leaders with vision, character and competence leading the church in Japan. We aim to identify, develop and release emerging kingdom leaders who will unite the church, multiply leaders and congregations, and extend the transforming power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

SIM Japan Vision and Mission

Our vision is to be used by the Lord for churches in Japan to send and receive mission workers to share the gospel. Our mission is to send and support mission workers and to receive mission workers from all over the world to share the gospel with Japanese people.

Ministry

- SIM Japan mobilises workers from within Japan to serve in mission globally and is preparing to receive mission workers from around the world to Japan.
- A3 partners with A2J, a Japanese-led movement of churches focused on training pastors, encouraging young leaders, supporting regional church multiplication, and uniting the church in Japan to reach two per cent of the population with the gospel.
- A3 partners with local churches and networks. We encourage our mission workers to promote church multiplication on a local, regional and national level.

Rural or non-urban Japan ('inaka')

More than 30 million people live in rural Japan (municipalities under 50,000 people).

The Christian population of these areas is estimated at 0.1 per cent and roughly twothirds of these towns do not have a church.

After the earthquakes in Tohoku (2011) and Kumamoto (2016), there has been some growth in Christianity.

Churches have been started, and people who have been historically resistant to Christianity, such as farmers and fishers, have become Christ-followers. A3 prioritises partnering with church multiplication projects in these least-reached areas.



Tohoku (north east Japan)


More than half of our team ministers in Miyagi, Yamagata, and Fukushima prefectures. There is

a great need for workers in Fukushima, where stigmas related to the nuclear disaster have significantly limited ministry. This team is partnering with local churches and helping them reach out to communities where Christ is least known.

In the latter part of the 1970s, Africa Inland Mission invited SIM workers to come to Kenya under their umbrella and work among the Somalis in Wajir, Nairobi and Mombasa. We long to see communities where Christ is least known being transformed by the gospel.

Digo

The Digo are an East African tribe, concentrated on the southern coastal strip of Kenya between Mombasa and the border of Tanzania. In a country that is largely Christian, the Digo are nearly all Muslim. The Digo have never been reached successfully with the gospel. The religious practices of the Digo are deeply rooted in spiritism and folk Islam.




Orma

The Orma are semi-nomadic people who live in the south eastern parts of Kenya in Tana River and Lamu counties. The Orma are almost exclusively Muslim and have been so for three or four generations. They are devoted in their faith, observing all the rites and religious festivals. Most of the Orma have never heard



the name of Jesus as the son of God, but that Jesus was simply a prophet, teacher or a good man.

- outreach, disciple-making and church planting among Muslim communities in the coastal areas and northern Kenya
- theological educators who can equip Christian leaders for local, regional, and global mission
- Christian workers who can disciple young people in churches, educational institutions and communities
- young health professionals mobilised, trained and equipped for medical mission



By faith, we see:

- local churches raising awareness of God's mission and encouraging believers to live out God's purpose for the whole world.

Muslim migrants

South Korea has been a mono-ethnic nation for nearly 5,000 years. However, it is now becoming multi-ethnic due to a dramatic decline in birth rates and an influx of more than 2.5 million immigrants, including 300,000 Muslims. Most Muslims came to escape economic poverty and to work as labourers, mainly around industrial zones. We



need wisdom as we consider strategies to reach them with the good news of Jesus.

Generation MZ

Generation MZ is predominantly used here to refer to those born between 1981 and 2012. Among college students, 68 per cent have no religious affiliation and only 30 per cent have ever attended church. The rate of unchurched youth has doubled in the last five years but suicide is the leading cause of death among our youth. These MZers need healing from anxiety and their secular values through the gospel.

Community B

After years of tension and disconnection, there are slow signs of doors opening after the Covid-19 pandemic. Organisations are preparing to resume activities. We need to be cautious about political tensions. Strategies need to be developed to provide more support for various organisations seeking to work with this community. We also need to maintain an up-to-date understanding of the community and to seek God's clear guidance and wisdom in collaboration with partner organisations.

- meaningful connections that God will establish and for him to empower local churches through equipping programmes
- the SIMers Mission School and 'Be n Go' programme to equip young people so they experience transformation and engage in God's mission, both locally and globally
- migrants to encounter the life-changing message of the gospel and grow as devoted followers of Jesus as we minister to them



The Manya people


Living in the forested north west region of Liberia, the Manya people are part of the Malinke people whose history dates to the Malian Empire. Today they practise a mix of African traditional religion and Islam. For the most part they are farmers, though many also make a living as mechanics and merchants. The majority of Manya people are living and



dying without Christ. Praise God that the Bible is being translated into their language!

- our mission family working on Bible translation and reaching out to Manya neighbours through health care
- more workers among the Manya people. Pray that God will call Liberian Christians as mission workers to people in remote areas, including among the Manya
- a strong church to be established among the Manya
- our SIM Liberia Administrative and Services Team. Working behind the scenes, they ensure that our personnel are cared for and that our campus is kept running well. They carry heavy and essential roles
- God to meet the urgent personnel needs on the service and administrative teams, including a Chief Financial Officer, an Electrical Engineer, a Mechanical Engineer, and a Construction Engineer

Islamic people


Islam is making a big effort to draw people away from Christ and build mosques in all major centres. There are many churches in Madagascar but there are areas where Islam is dominant and other places where Christianity is nominal and without power. Villages are small, scattered and relatively isolated from each other in the rural areas. Many are without Christian witness.

One of the poorest countries in the world, Madagascar also suffers from many cyclones and periods of drought. Each threatens the food supply of marginal areas.

The Yao people

The approximately 1.7 million Yao who live in Malawi are 99 per cent Muslim. They combine Muslim beliefs with traditional African religion, seeking to please their deceased ancestors and living in fear of curses.

SIM has been working among the Yao since the late 1980s and has found them resistant to Christian influence. In 2014, SIM, in partnership with the Bible Society, published the complete Bible in the Yao language.

SIM currently has two mission worker families church-planting among the Yao and a third couple preparing to join. The Namwera Yao Evangelical Church opened in 2019, and another church plant is in the village of Kazembe Mataka. Bible study groups meet regularly in 11 other villages. Yao believers






are being discipled to reach their families and friends with the gospel. A Yao couple graduated from Bible college in October, 2023 and are leading the church in Namwera.

Land was purchased and is being developed for the church in Namwera to use as a mission base and for other outreach activities.

- God to penetrate the hearts of the Yao people and of the Indian and Chinese diaspora peoples, and for the new believers to become courageous witnesses in their communities
- students and church leaders to live out the gospel and for the church to share the gospel with others in Malawi and beyond

The Soninke, Fulani, and Moors of south west Mali

In Mali, the communities where Christ is least known are the Soninke, the Moors the Tuareg and the Fula.

Khossani is a big, old town north of Kayes city and four ethnic groups live there: the Soninke, the Moors, the Fulani and the Khassonkes.

The first two are the most numerous Islamic groups. The Soninke occupy the west, while the Moors are in the east, occupying 17 villages with a population of more than 12,000. They are farmers and herdsmen. The region is isolated from the open world. Access roads are rocky and sandy, with many of the villages blocked for





months in the rainy season. The Fulani live throughout this area.

This region is not only spiritually impoverished but also lacks basic social amenities. There are no clinics or schools and an insufficient supply of good water. This has created a sense of inferiority, low initiative and isolation. They are calm and accommodating and do not compete with other ethnic groups.

At present, SIM mission workers are only working directly among the Moor communities, thanks to the Faithful Witness team installed in late 2020. This team lives in the Kayes region, where temperatures can reach more than 50°C in the hottest months of the year.

International students

Malaysia is well on course to achieve its target of 250,000 international students by 2025, up from the current figure of 170,000, who come from 162 countries. Malaysia is a popular educational destination for many students from Asian countries, the Middle East and Africa. The new chapter of International Student Ministry of Malaysia (cross-church and cross-agency) was launched in January, 2023. Partnering with churches and mission partners to share the gospel of Christ, Lord willing, many of them will come to know Jesus.

Diaspora communities

The Lord has brought many nations to Malaysia. There are about 2.6 million non-citizens in Malaysia. They are predominantly asylum seekers, refugees and migrant workers and come from least-reached nations, particularly Muslim countries. Many have come to live, work, or study without legal status. The vulnerable diaspora communities are more prone to injustice and exploitation. Truly, God has prepared the mission on our doorstep for Malaysian believers and churches to rise up, encourage people and transform lives.

Frontier people groups

These communities can be found across Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand and neighbouring south east Asian countries. Some live in the cities and are educated business people and professionals, while others stay in the rural areas as blue-collar workers. Most live in close-knit family structures. Few attempts have been made to evangelise these groups. God's breakthrough and creative access is urgently needed to reach these communities.

- God to send workers from diverse nationalities to work among international students on university campuses across the country
- more skilled workers to be raised up for the diaspora communities among the migrants, refugees and asylum seekers
- spiritual strongholds to be pulled down so that the churches, including both foreign and local believers, can cross the barriers to share the gospel and the love of Christ with all people, particularly the frontier people
- greater partnerships with national churches for cross-cultural mission, both locally and globally

Hindus and Muslims

The Bhojpuris are an ethnic sub-group and make up the majority of Indians in Mauritius.

Muslim communities, too, are proud of their religion and heritage. The same is true of many nominally religious Christian people.


Only the gospel of Jesus Christ has the power to break through the religious barriers.


Marginalised people

Rural Mongolians

When we think of Mongolia, we often picture the rolling green grasses of the steppes, the gers (the traditional Mongolian felt tents of the nomads), or the nomads and their amazing horse-



riding skills. While this is true, it only represents a small part of today's Mongolia. It is a rapidly-developing country, which holds strong ties to its nomadic past, yet is heavily influenced by the Soviet era.

Today, most of the population lives in the capital, Ulaanbaatar, where it is common to see a modern glass office tower sitting alongside a crumbling Soviet-era building. Ringing the city are the sprawling ger districts – small plots of land with gers. As the city changes with the migrating population, so these districts are being filled in with small buildings.

Our ministry is heavily focused on urban outreach but there is a strong desire to reach out to the less-reached countryside areas. A growing number of members are working in, or looking towards, the countryside for possible new ministries.

- the team, which has grown in the past year, praise God, but is also in a season of transition as the leadership is changing
- the next entity director to lead faithfully and use his or her skills to develop the next steps

Yao

It's said that to be Yao is to be Muslim. The Yao people typically mix traditional African beliefs with Islam to form a Folk Islam. Today, most of the 500,000 Yao in north west Mozambique are subsistence farmers. They have a high rate of illiteracy and short life expectancy. In the past 10 years, the number of Yao Christians in Mozambique has grown from around 300 to 3,500, so God has opened a door and there is no better time than now for evangelism and discipleship ministries.




Makuwa-Metto and Makuwa-Chirima

There are about one million people in each of these groups. Most are subsistence farmers, working their fields with handheld tools. There is a growing trend of Makuwas moving to towns and cities, where unemployment and promiscuity are prevalent.

Most adhere to Folk Islam or Folk Catholicism. In urban areas, where some small churches exist, well-trained leaders are needed. A new Bible translation in the local language is facilitating evangelism and discipleship.

- students past and present at INTEL and the development of students into future pastors and servants at the school
- fruitful harvest of new believers and for ongoing discipleship among the Yao

Namibia Day 2



Vision

Convinced that no one should live and die without hearing the gospel, we are partnering with churches and other organisations to reach children and young people with the gospel. By faith, we see people being discipled both inside and outside churches. By faith, we see Namibians called to be mission workers.

Children and youth

Young people make up 60 per cent of the Namibian population and are heavily influenced by secular culture. SIM partners with various community development programmes and schools to reach children and youth with the gospel. For example, we are partnering with Samaritan's Purse to give out gift boxes to children in least-reached communities among the San people. This opens the door to teach them the gospel. In addition, we also train local church youth workers to help make disciples of the next generation.





Leadership training

While a large part of the population claims Christianity in name, a much smaller

percentage are following Christ with their lives. Therefore, we are working with a local seminary to train and equip the next generation of pastors and church leaders to disciple their own congregations. The seminary is working on expanding the reach of its training by starting small group 'Learning Communities' in various towns around the country, each led by a trained local facilitator.

- God to send more workers to Namibia
- the churches in Namibia to hear God's calling to support mission and send out workers, both inside and outside the country
- God to use Christmas gift boxes to open doors for the gospel to be shared among the San people
- more Namibian pastors to have a passion for reaching their communities with the life-changing good news of the gospel


The non-believing majority

Like most Western countries, New Zealand has seen a steady decline in church attendance. Many churches have shrinking congregations, others have closed and the ones that are growing are doing so by adding people who used to belong to other churches. Immigration has brought many people who belong to other faiths, but the overwhelming trend is increasing



secularisation. This is the environment SIM New Zealand works in. But, of course, there are also encouraging signs, such as the Pacific Island church that recently invited SIM NZ to expand its understanding of mission, and churches attracting migrants by becoming known for welcoming multi-cultural congregations.

- more opportunities with local churches to share SIM NZ's vision and get their help in mobilising New Zealanders for mission
- creativity as we work to encourage Christians to form or join SIM prayer groups and build up the number of those faithfully holding up our workers in prayer
- inspiration for SIM New Zealand staff as they work to support our mission workers and discover better ways of doing this
- the spiritual and physical well-being of our mission workers, who are often very far from home



Having just celebrated God's faithfulness to our entity over 100 years of service, we continue to seek to make disciples where Christ is least known. We live in a world permeated by an evil that has left humankind separated from the creator and trapped in sin. Convinced that the gospel changes everything and sets us free, SIM aims to bring this life-changing message to Niger, where 27 million people are living and dying without Christ. The task is great.

Fulani

The Fulani are one of the largest ethnic groups in West Africa, stretching from Senegal into parts of central Africa.

While they have a common language, the many dialects can make the Fulfulde spoken in one area almost incomprehensible in another.

Fulani are traditionally nomadic herders but a significant number are now settled in villages and towns as farmers, artisans and merchants. However, owning cattle is still key to their ethnic identity and many count their riches by the number of cattle they own.

Islam, the most prevalent religion among the Fulani, is also a key part of their ethnic

identity. The Fulani culture values self-control and does not allow any demonstrations of weakness.

In Niger, the New Testament is now available in two dialects. There are small groups of believers among the Fulani. Mission workers serving with the Fulani use a variety of tools to share the gospel: radio broadcasts, social media, literacy support, Bible translation, friendship evangelism and the ongoing nurturing of new believers.

- the Fulani who have responded to the gospel, that God will give them courage to remain faithful to him, despite much opposition from their families and society.
 Pray many more will respond to the gospel
- God to raise up more Fulani to be evangelists to their own people. Pray for God's protection on those already involved in evangelism and discipleship
- the pastors of local churches to be men of integrity and vision, united in purpose, and for the churches to grow a mission vision
- more workers for the harvest, including, but not limited to, teachers, doctors and those with administrative skills
- SIM Niger, as we navigate the security tensions of the Sahel region. Pray that doors

Day 21



By faith, we see a response to the gospel message from the more than 100 million Muslims and others living and dying without Christ in Nigeria; mission teams in each of the 12 northern Sharia states expressing Christ's love and compassion in word and deed; strengthened churches with equipped Christians carrying out Christ's mandate to make disciples in one of Africa's most influential and populous countries, and also making a major impact in global mission.

- Empowering and making disciples among the vast numbers of youth in Nigeria.
- Equipping an enthusiastic and growing church through theological education, other disciple-making endeavours and convert care.

Muslim communities

Almost half of Nigeria's 215 million people are Muslim, and our team prays to expand our ministries to reach them. We need more workers with a heart for Muslim evangelism to focus on outreach through medical ministry, water projects, vocational training, business consultation, teaching English, Christian schools in Muslim-dominant communities, media and other creative ways to meet felt needs and build relationships. There are open opportunities for ministry



but timing is critical while it is still legal to share the gospel.

Fulani

There are approximately 20 million Fulani in Nigeria. They show openness to friendship and gospel discussions, and our team to reach them is growing. We praise God for new partnership opportunities with local mission workers to expand the outreach to this predominantly Muslim community.

Attacks by some Fulani herdsmen against Christian farmers have affected attitudes. We pray for more workers, for effective outreach, for a spirit of love from national Christians and for opportunities to support and disciple Fulani believers. We long for more workers to minister among this group.

- increased efforts, fresh approaches and more workers to reach Muslims in Nigeria while the door is open (John 9:4), especially in the north
- effective, contextualised ministry to Muslim-background believers
- revival in the national church and an increasing passion for gospel-focused ministry
- Faithful Witness workers to raise adequate support to continue Fulani ministry
- adjustment to a new Director, Deputy Director and Personnel Coordinator in 2025
- persecuted believers to endure hardship, receive trauma healing and practise
 Christ's love and forgiveness
- our urgent need for theological educators, medical professionals, educational consultants, teachers and a coordinator for our anti-human trafficking ministry
- establishment of a new school in Kano to facilitate relationships with Muslims

There are fewer followers of Christ here than on earth. Believers are routinely persecuted and some are imprisoned. Workers are watched by authorities and some have been forced to leave. Despite the risks, our workers aim to develop relationships with people of peace and speak about Jesus every day, whether in the workplace or in the neighbourhood.

We are seeing some fruit. Through business and employment opportunities, we are building everlasting relationships with employees, community leaders, neighbours, language teachers and new believers.





University students

Workers from Francophone Africa serve as campus disciplers. They mobilise Christian sub-Saharan African university students to be witnesses of Jesus on North African campuses, where more than 35 per cent of North African youth no longer believe Islam is true. Thank God that students have much more freedom on campus than workers do.

Nomads

Among the 92 ethnic groups in North Africa, 22 are nomadic. Very few workers are bringing the gospel to them. The work is challenging and requires great creativity.

- persecuted believers, some imprisoned, many traumatised and almost all ostracised by their families
- unity in the tiny church
- more business people, professionals and skilled tradespeople to obey God's call to North Africa
- young people who are searching for truth; may they hear the gospel and follow Jesus

Huge numbers of young people, especially boys and men, are addicted to drugs and alcohol. There are very




few places for those with little money who want to break free, and even fewer where freedom in Jesus can be found.

The traditional homeland of Saraiki speakers is in central Pakistan, where SIM has been working with local churches for decades. The Saraikis are hospitable people, numbering around 20 million. We pray many will come to know the Lord.

Rural subsistence families

Around 40 per cent of Paraguay's people live in scattered, rural subsistence communities. Oral learning in the Guaraní language is strongly preferred. Using oral methods, church planting teams are evangelising, discipling and training church leaders.



Indigenous communities

Many of those who belong to Paraguay's 19 indigenous groups live and die without sufficient access to God's good news. An SIM team has answered a partnership invitation from indigenous




church leaders to unite in evangelism and discipleship efforts. One team member uses his optometry skills to partner with local believers in bringing God's word to new communities. The recording studio GGG continues to record scripture and study materials in local languages.

Pray for

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- mobilising partnerships with the deaf and other marginalised communities
- the SIM team leadership and governance board, financial and personnel coordination, short-term volunteer ministry, TCK ministry
- partnership with First Nations leaders: optometry partnership and discipleship; community empowerment and heart language multimedia production

International prisoners in Lima

Foreign men and women are targeted to become drug mules to take cocaine out of Peru. Often, they have come from broken, abusive homes, have mental health issues and struggle with addictions which make them vulnerable targets. These men and women come from all ages and stages of life and are desperate for money to relieve their difficulties.

Because the Peruvian prison system relies on family support for the inmates, foreign prisoners face huge language and cultural barriers.


Our ministry, Walking in Liberty, visits the women's prison to share the message of freedom to the women inside the prison and provide humanitarian support. Our prison Bible studies are conducted in English, Spanish, Mandarin and Malay. When the women are released, there are ongoing discipleship opportunities offered to them while living in Lima. We also have some ongoing contact with those who have returned to their passport country.

Muslims

Fourteen Muslim unreached people groups account for about seven million people in the Philippines. Muslim background believers are thought to be less than one per cent of this number, although with some not able to openly identify as believers the number may be a little higher.



Over the past 60 years, many Muslims

have migrated north and there is a continual movement of people away from the Muslim majority areas, who then return 'home' either permanently or for a time.

People who are away from the stronger influence of Islam in the south are much more accessible and open to the gospel. This is especially true when life in the north does not live up to expectations and they struggle to find work or housing or provide for their families. This gives our teams a wonderful opportunity to show the love of God and lives are being changed. Contacts often comment, "Why is it you Christians are helping me and not my Muslim community?"


Apart from encountering Jesus through the love and care shown to them by Christians, many are encountering him through dreams, visions, healings and miracles.

The smartphone generation

Around 40 per cent of Senegal's population falls into the 'teenager/young adult' category. If you walk around the cities, you will notice the vast majority of them use connected devices. Even the functionally illiterate manage to communicate via WhatsApp, listen to music and watch videos. Most of this large potential audience are Muslims, who do not have



friends who know Jesus and have never heard a clear presentation of the gospel. They are often open to engaging with evangelistic materials in Wolof they find online or via social media. We thank God for the increasing number of such resources and the interest that has already been shown in them.

Village communities

Despite increasing urbanisation, most people in Senegal have roots in a village. Life there moves at a slower pace but is far from idyllic - subsistence farming involves a lot of hard, physical work. In villages near cities, women get up early, go to the city to work and come home late at night. They do not have time to care for their children.

SIM works in one such village, teaching children fundamental daily life skills and early academic skills. We also give moral lessons based on Christian values - all with the permission of the village authorities in an exclusively Muslim context.

- a classroom for toddlers to be built in the village where we are working
- partnerships with local believers to create captivating evangelistic resources for Senegalese internet users
- capacity to follow up with those who respond to online content
- opportunities to share Christ through teaching, training and medical ministries
- faithful teaching of both adults and youth in local churches, particularly in Wolof
- the Pastors' Book Set project and the distribution of books at a conference in February
- God to raise up more long-term workers, especially for the youth training and English teaching centres

The journey of Joy

Coach Joy in Kenya has an infectious smile and radiates love for everyone she meets.

But Joy's life has had some very challenging seasons. When she was eight, her father tied her up and, in a moment of rage, poured kerosene over her arms and neck and set her on fire. She was rescued by the villagers who heard her screams.




As she grew up, she lacked security in who she was and felt that she would never be beautiful. While her arms and hands bore most of the scarring, Joy felt the wounds on her heart, mind and soul. As her love for soccer grew, she joined a team. Her coach showed her an unconditional love that she never expected. Her life began to change as biblical truth shared by her coach contradicted the lies that she had believed about herself and others. While it took time for her to surrender her life to Christ, she was watching, listening and learning from her coach.

Today, Joy is on staff with the Sports Friends Kenya team, coaching and training other coaches. She also coaches her own team, giving them a safe space where they are needed and accepted, and sharing the love of Jesus with them. Joy has forgiven her father - and he has given his life to Christ! She is no longer ashamed to tell her story, knowing she is able to comfort others, bring them hope and give God full glory in it all.

Muslims

Muslims make up almost 10 per cent (approximately 2.1 million) of Sri Lanka's population and their numbers are rising.

The Moors, who make up a significant portion of the Muslim community, are mainly descendants of Arabs who came as traders. Muslim tradesmen who arrived from India are



also counted in this group. The Malays, a smaller Muslim group found in Sri Lanka, are of Malaysian and Indonesian descent.

Muslim influence has grown, due to intermarriage between these people groups and Sri Lankans, bringing political leadership and economic sway. The influence of Muslims far exceeds their numbers. Even though a few hundred people among them have come to follow Christ, there are no churches with congregants or pastors from Muslim backgrounds.

In the last few decades, a small segment of the church has become conscious of the need to share God's love with these neighbours. There has been little opposition to, or initiation of, gospel work among Muslim communities.


SIM is part of a network whose goal is to reach these people through organising conferences, providing training and bringing awareness and direction to the church about outreach to Muslims.

Pray for

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- the church to become aware of the gospel need in Sri Lankan Muslim communities, dispel inhibitions about relating to them and learn how best to share the gospel
- the salvation of the 2.1 million Muslims who live in Sri Lanka

Muslim communities

Islam is the third largest religion in Switzerland, with more than 300,000 adherents - 5.2 per cent of the population. Many of them are refugees or asylum seekers and come from diverse countries including Albania, Turkey, Bosnia and Kosovo.

Muslim communities began arriving in Switzerland in the 1960s with Turkish guest workers and continued with waves of refugees fleeing the Balkan conflicts in the 1990s. More



recently, Switzerland has seen many refugees from Afghanistan. There are now Muslim communities across Switzerland, many of whom maintain strong cultural and religious connections to their countries of origin.

Christians in Switzerland face challenges in reaching Muslims. Despite the availability of Christian resources in different languages and ongoing mission efforts, many Muslims remain steadfast in their faith. Overcoming these barriers requires fervent prayer, because only God can reveal the need for a sinless saviour who can reconcile them with God.

Pray for

- a deep spiritual hunger among people in Switzerland, especially among Muslims, that draws them to seek and encounter Jesus Christ
- Christians to share their faith boldly and lovingly with Muslims around them
- good networking and partnerships with churches and organisations
- the vision for cross-cultural work, especially among the younger generation, to inspire them to engage in mission efforts locally and globally
- creative ways to mobilise people for mission work
- an increase in the number of mission workers

People to people

One of the areas where Christ is least known is along the south east coast of Tanzania, hence our motto: 'The Coast, for Christ, by the Church.'

It is all about relationships, as we see in the extensive greeting rituals: How is your father? How is your mother? Your work? Your home? You are considered rude if you are not interested. People care about people.

Houses are not built to face a view of the ocean or mountain, but to face those who will come to visit. People are important and need to be welcomed properly. Strangers will be invited inside for a glass of water, to sit, and find rest.

Local churches are realising the importance of showing their care for neighbours who do not know Christ.

A typical outreach consists of






door-to-door evangelism during the week, with an invitation to the Jesus Film which is shown later that week. In the past, this has led to the planting of small churches, which are still operating today. Pray for more churches to catch this vision, so they can play a role in seeing the church multiply in nearby villages where there is, as yet, no church.

- breakthroughs at government level. SIM Tanzania is currently waiting for reregistration as a charitable organisation; the process has been delayed to the point where all the foreign workers have had to leave due to visa challenges
- suitable local leaders who can take SIM through these processes, to stand up
- firm-standing leaders for the newly-planted churches, as they struggle daily to overcome challenges while continuing to serve the body of Christ
- new believers to stand firm as they face many discouragements and hardships
- churches to find meaningful ways of showing their care for neighbours who do not know Christ, that hearts will be touched and changed

Vision

Elderly people in rural Taiwan

The hometown of Taiwan's current president, Lai Ching-te, is Wanli, on the north eastern coast of Taiwan, about a 90-minute drive from the capital, Taipei. Decades ago, it was a major coal mining area. By the end of 2023, the total population was less than 21,000, with more than 22.5 per cent over the age of 65! The elderly mostly live alone and rarely see their children. There are only three small evangelical churches in Wanli, so the elderly have few opportunities to meet Christians.

This is typical of Taiwan. The young and middle-aged migrate to the cities, where medical resources and living conditions are better. Rural churches are few and small, and there are very few opportunities to hear the gospel and know Jesus.






There are more than four million elderly people in Taiwan, and nearly half of them live in rural areas; they are the hidden 'unreached people group', often neglected by urban churches. Their lives and thoughts are very traditional and warm-hearted. They, like you and me, need to know Jesus and make him Lord of their lives. But they have limited time to choose.

- more workers from Taiwan who are after God's heart and will go to least-reached people groups to make disciples for the Lord
- open doors for connecting with churches and organisations in Taiwan to partner in serving migrant workers, international students and elderly people in rural areas
- suitable workers who can witness Christ to the unreached people groups in Taiwan

Ayutthaya

This city lies in a transition zone between Bangkok and the rest of Thailand, meaning it has both an urban attitude and a rural mindset. Almost 90 per cent of Ayutthaya's people are Thai Buddhist, with the remainder largely Muslim. The Christian church represents a mere 0.01 per cent of this province. The SIM multi-skilled, multi-cultural church-planting team in Ayutthaya is making an impact in the community by being involved in ministries such as teaching in government schools, life skills training, art and sport. They are building relationships with local people, presenting the gospel and connecting them with local established churches in this area.






Youth

Sports ministry can be a powerful tool for the church to build relationships with young people and share the hope of the gospel. Sports Friends Thailand focuses on training Christian leaders to be coaches in soccer and volleyball, equipping them with the skills for ministry and sports training. These coaches mentor and share Christ's love with young people, helping them become mature disciples. These relationships can often reach into the young peoples' wider families and entire communities.

- a potential new church plant in the south of Chiang Mai and for God to use his workers to be his beacon of light in these areas
- adjustment for the growing team in Ayutthaya, with many workers completing language learning and entering into new ministries
- God to use his workers, with all their training and skills, for his glory

North west England

The UK has a population of 65 million, almost 10 million of whom were born outside the country. Society is becoming increasingly diverse and that can create tensions and challenges. But it also creates massive crosscultural opportunities for churches to reach the world on their doorstep.

There is a great opportunity to reach people of south Asian descent in the Manchester region in north west England. SIM has already received several workers from south Asia who are serving here, alongside local churches, through our Engage programme.

One couple are helping lead an inter-cultural church, engaging in street evangelism, running a bookstall and running English classes. Another



couple have recently moved to the area from south Asia and have set up a training course that gives Christians the skills, confidence and resources to build Christ-centred friendships with people from a Muslim background.

A UK family who have served with SIM in south Asia have also moved to the region, hoping to use their language and cultural experience to build bridges into local south Asian communities.

Many churches in the UK have a heart to welcome people from other nations but need help from people with cross-cultural experience to know how best to develop inter-cultural churches. Pray SIM UK can help facilitate people to serve in this area and provide more opportunities for training and resourcing.

- the new leadership team in the UK as they seek to build better relationships with churches and so see more workers sent around the world
- opportunities for more workers to come and serve in the UK through our Engage programme, and for more churches being willing to host and resource them
- a growing heart in the UK and Ireland to pray for the least-reached communities of the globe, leading to more willingness to go sacrificially
- thank God that he is stirring the hearts of a younger generation in the UK who want to step out and serve

Immigrants, refugees and international students

In the last decade, more than one million people have immigrated to Atlanta, Georgia, from almost every nation. Known as the most diverse square mile in America, Clarkston is a suburb of Atlanta that is home to refugees from more than 60 countries who speak more than 110 dialects, with at least 90 unreached people groups identified. Within this extraordinary context, Global Frontier Missions (GFM), a SIM USA partner ministry, cares for, and builds relationships with, resettled refugees. For most of the community, this is their first opportunity to hear the gospel and begin to understand God's love. Some SIM USA workers participate in this caring witness, while gaining from







GFM's cross-cultural missions training that equips followers of Jesus to be effective disciple-makers and helps prepare them holistically for cross-cultural ministry abroad.

The deaf

Uruguay is a country often recognised by the world for being at the forefront of inclusion and rights. However, one of the most segregated groups in this society is the deaf.

According to the last census (2011), there are approximately 30,000 deaf people in Uruguay. Their first language is Uruguayan Sign Language, which is not only different from Spanish but is even different from the sign language of other Spanish-speaking countries. Although most learn to read and write in Spanish, they usually do not fully understand it.

In the same way, most hearing people do not know how to 'speak' sign language. Therefore, deaf people often find themselves isolated from the society in which they live. And in the interior of the country, conditions can be worse because deaf people are often






neglected or mistreated by families who lack the resources to know how to help.

The Association of the Deaf of Uruguay has a special school for the deaf in the capital, Montevideo, and there is one church entirely made up of deaf people (around 40 attendees) which is, unfortunately, currently without a pastor. There is one other small deaf community that participates in a hearing Baptist church. For this reason, SIM Uruguay has identified the deaf population as a least-reached people group in its context. As part of a local Bible society project, a group of deaf people are currently translating the entire Bible into Uruguayan Sign Language.

- God to open up new ministry opportunities in this country because it has so much spiritual need



By faith, we see Vietnamese communities where Christ is least known being engaged with the gospel by a multi-ethnic team, reflecting Christ through character, word and action; and God's people belonging to growing, maturing, indigenous and missionminded churches, being and making disciples of Jesus in Vietnam and beyond.

Ministry

- Developing church leaders through theological education and training for biblical relationships in the home, church and community.
- Training Vietnamese chaplains to help those in trauma by providing them with God's love and comfort.
- Being witnesses in the workplace through various missional business methods.
- Establishing in-country support services for a growing team of workers.

Minority people groups

There are approximately 68 unreached people groups in Vietnam. Of those, 30 have fewer than one per cent professing Christians and 15 have no Christ followers.

In these communities, when a person receives Jesus Christ as Saviour, he or she is eager to follow the biblical mandate to lead others to Christ by making, baptising, and teaching disciples (Matthew 28:19-20).

The new believer's response is often to plant and shepherd a church in his or her community. These pastors have low



education and Bible knowledge levels. Their risk of persecution is high. Their journey can be lonely, with no one available to guide them to grow in their new faith.

Majority people group

The Kinh people make up 86 per cent of the population. They have Christian resources but only 1.2 per cent of the more than 84 million Viet-Kinh - the largest unreached people group in south east Asia - are Christ followers.

Pray for

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- minority pastors and those they shepherd, that they can hear and understand God's word and teach others accurately so more can hear the good news
- the Kinh majority community to be awakened to the good news of Jesus and share it boldly with others
- believers to have a growing vision to reach out boldly to those in their communities who do not know Jesus
- churches without a pastor to find one with adequate Bible knowledge
- those facing persecution for their faith to have courage and perseverance
- the training of Vietnamese Christians so they can equip their people and develop leaders who can teach biblical principles for godly living
- the nation to be tolerant of Christianity and outreach
- Communist Party members, government officials and military personnel, who are pillars of Vietnamese society
- a permanent presence to be established in the country to support workers
- workers who will live here and make disciples in culturally appropriate ways



Convinced that no one should live and die without hearing God's good news, the West Africa Mission Office partners with the West African church for the success of global mission; mobilises and sends qualified, equipped workers from and through the West African church all over the world, crossing cultural barriers with love to those living and dying without Christ; and enables the making of disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ in communities where he is least known, through workers sent from West Africa.

- Mobilising in West Africa for the recruitment of new workers.
- Partnering with local like-minded churches, mission organisations and other regional bodies in West Africa for global mission.
- Training and sending mission workers from West Africa.
- Mobilising prayer and financial support.

Abéché, Chad

We send workers to Abéché, the capital of the Ouadai region in the east of Chad, towards Sudan. It is one of the four largest cities in Chad and the most heavily Islamicised. The population is estimated to be 95 per cent Muslim and is made up of several ethnic groups. These include Arabs, Goran, Mimi, Zaghawa Tama and Masalit, among others. All these groups are unreached by the gospel. The remaining five per cent of the population is made up of people from southern Chad, including small numbers of evangelicals and Catholics. Less than one per cent of the indigenous population is evangelical Christian.



- the unity of the few existing churches in Abéché and for the expansion of the gospel
- the steadfastness of Christians who come from Muslim backgrounds in the face of many forms of persecution
- the population of Abéché, which is deeply rooted in Islam, to be open to the gospel
- wisdom, knowledge, understanding and provision of good health for those preaching the gospel and serving the people in Abéché

University students


Most university students have been exposed to Christianity but struggle to understand their faith and grow in their walk with God. At university, they are heavily influenced by secular education and educators when they are exploring new opportunities and ideologies. Therefore, discipleship and mentoring are vital.

Pray for

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- praise God for providing a new director for SIM Zambia
- wisdom, unity and harmony as new workers come into key positions in personnel and finance in SIM Zambia
- the youth centre staff and the secondary school chaplain to have lives of integrity, grow deeper in their faith, and be beacons to the community
- our health workers for wisdom, protection, stamina and supplies. Pray too for the physical and spiritual needs of their patients
- our community development ministry, teaching farmers to grow food for their families and impact their lives spiritually. Farming is now being affected by drought, leading to food shortages, high prices and malnutrition. Pray for rain

Vision

By faith, we see a witness of Christ to every Zimbabwean, so that no one lives and dies without hearing the gospel and responding to it; believers are discipled into a fuller understanding of their faith; and Christ's compassionate love is expressed and shared with the poor, hurting and suffering.

- Outreach ministries: children, particularly vulnerable girls; youth; college and university students; those impacted by HIV, AIDS and Covid-19; and the prevention of human trafficking.

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Communities where Christ is least known

The Nambya people

The Nambya people are an ethnic group of about 100,000 people, based in the north western parts of Zimbabwe. They are found around the coal mining town of Hwange and surrounding areas of Victoria Falls.

They believe in a supreme being and ancestors who heal and protect them from evil; they also believe ancestral spirits are benevolent or malevolent and may inspire individual gifts such as healing.

Their faith is an ethnoreligion, deeply rooted in their ethnic identity.

According to the Joshua Project, the Nambya of Zimbabwe are engaged but unreached. Bringing them to faith in Jesus Christ requires patience and a good understanding of the culture.

- more Nambyan people to come to know Jesus Christ and stand as witnesses for him in their communities
- gospel workers who can communicate fluently in the Nambyan language
- SIM Zimbabwe to have an opportunity to reach Nambyan people with the gospel
